## How to Build a Birdhouse

Here is how to do it!


If you want a rewarding experience and to learn about birds, why not build a bird house? There are many different types of birds who will make your birdhouse a home to raise their young. Bluebirds, house wrens, tree swallows and woodpeckers could all choose to occupy a new bird house.

The first thing you need to do is find the best location to build the bird house. For example, bluebirds like to be surrounded by open fields so they can eat insects. Chickadees however, like thick trees for protection.

Now you are ready to build your house!

**Step 1** Gather the materials. You will need a piece of cedar or redwood that is 1 inch X 8 inches x 8 feet. Make sure you get an adult to help you.

**Step 2** Cut the boards to the proper length. Use the diagram below to measure all your lengths.



**Step 3** Cut a round hole in the front for the entrance.

**Step 4** Attach the boards *together* using glue or nails.

**Step 5** Paint your birdhouse and let it dry for at least two hours.

**Step 6** Find a great spot by your house and hang it up.

Now it is time to wait for a bird family to make it their home!
